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Occupational therapist degree cost

Most people have heard some kind of statistic regarding tuition fees, student loan debt, or overall college costs. We are hearing about these giant figures that are supposed to reflect the costs of higher education, and that is exactly what those numbers are doing, but only to some extent. For example, according to the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), the average cost of tuition, tuition, room and council was nearly \$20,000 for the 2011-12 school year. Cost figures vary widely across the type of institution, with an average of \$14,300 in public institutions, \$37,800 in private not-for-profit institutions and \$23,300 in private for-profit institutions. These types of figures are useful in that they distinguish between the price of public and out-of-state schools, as well as public and private schools. They also shed light on the rising cost of going to university. However, these estimates do not necessarily provide an accurate indicator of what you, the student, will pay for the university. And that's something you need to know. To learn more about the true cost of the university, we spoke with abigail Seldin, a college finance expert, vice president of innovation and product assistance at ecMC and co-founder of Abacus College. Source: Erika Rawes Sticker Price Versus Net Price The price of the tuition sticker is the dollar amount a school charges for tuition and fees before any grant, scholarship or other financial assistance. Schools with the highest sticker prices are usually private schools, such as Columbia and NYU. These schools have sticker prices in excess of \$60,000 if you add tuition, tuition, books, room and board, and personal expenses. Few people can afford to pay \$60,000 for university, even with student loans. Fortunately, the university's net price takes into account your individual financial and family situation. According to the NCES, the average net price (total cost minus grants) of attendance in 2011-12 for first-time students for the first time was \$12,410 in public four-year government institutions, \$21,330 in four-year private for-profit institutions, and \$23,540 in four-year private non-profit institutions. Note in the table above how people in low-income categories typically receive close to \$10,000 in grants and scholarships. This can make a big difference on a tuition bill. The net price is different school, too. To help students find the true price of the university, tools like Abacus College are designed to help students sort and compare the net costs of two or three colleges side by side. There is data available for more than 4,000 colleges and universities on the College Abacus database, which is free to use. For example, a 24-year-old student from a family of five without income may find that, although the University of California, Berkeley has a sticker price of \$32,706, after grants and assistance, the estimated net price of that student is closer to \$8,500, which is more feasible. At College Abacus, this student can also discover the four-year graduation rate at Berkeley, the typical sat scores among students who are accepted, the demographics within the school, and even data on the number of students defaulting on their loans after graduation. Source: Thinkstock Cost of college application, of course, is not free either - it requires a degree of time, energy and money that many students do not represent during college planning. According to U.S. News and World Report, the average cost of a university application is \$41. However, some schools charge up to \$90 in application fees. Therefore, if you apply in 10 schools, you can pay more than \$410 for the application fee alone. In addition to these costs, you must pay for SAT or ACT tests (approximately \$55), test preparation and visits to university campuses. A 2012 Fox Business publication found that families spend a combined total of about \$3,500 on these costs. You can reduce your application costs by narrowing your search. Do enough research to make sure you have a good mix of range, target and safety schools, Seldin says. You can reduce the cost of your university visits by using resources like YouTube to do virtual tours, carpooling with other families who make the same trip, or hitting a few birds with a stone - maybe going on a vacation and a college tour at the same time. Tips for applying for college when you make a major purchase — a car, a house or even a large electronic equipment — you usually find out how much money you need to spend on this item before shopping, right? Well, that same principle should apply when you choose a college. How much can you afford to pay for college? Asking this question can save you a lot of time, money and hassle, so before you even look for colleges, find a budget and determine exactly how much you want to spend now and how much you want to borrow towards your future. Second, don't assume that your estimated financial contribution (CTF), which is calculated based on your faysa forms, is the last word about what you're going to pay for the university, Seldin says. Each school uses its own algorithm to allocate financial assistance. Savvy students can use net price calculators, now posted on all college sites, to find out their actual results — which could be much higher or much lower than their EFC. Get your real number using the net price calculators displayed on school websites or save time by accessing it all in one place in CollegeAbacus.org. Finally, because the net price and price of stickers can differ so dramatically, do not exclude any school until you have checked the net prices on all schools of your choice. You may find that you can actually afford a school that you never imagined was in the cards for you. Occupational therapy is a profession that helps people develop, recover or improve life skills that have been lost to injuries, illnesses or disabilities. Occupational therapists, or OTs, use activities of daily living such as dressing, writing or using a computer as therapeutic activities. Occupational therapy assistants work under the supervision of an OT and may perform some of the same functions. In addition to the differences between education and work tasks, salaries for both roles are different. In 2011, the salary was \$52,150 for an occupational therapy assistant and \$74,970 for an OT, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. An occupational therapy assistant, or OTA, must have an associate degree and be licensed in some states. OTA education includes courses in psychology, pediatric health, biology and anatomy. Clinical field work is part of OTA education that helps it gain practical clinical skills and work experience. An OTA must graduate from an accredited program in order to obtain a licence and may also pass an exam to become a certified occupational therapy assistant. An OTA who wants to become ot should start by considering the differences between the two jobs and the skills or qualities that each can have in common. While OTs and OTAs can help patients perform exercises or teach them how to use specially modified tools and equipment, the OT is responsible for developing a treatment plan and assessing the patient's progress. Both professions require compassion and interpersonal skills. OTAs may need more physical strength as they spend a lot of time bending, kneeling or standing during patient therapy sessions. OTs need good writing and communication skills to communicate with patients, families and other members of the health care team. An OT has more education than an OTA - a master's degree is the minimum requirement

for the profession. OOs who want to become OTs may have already taken some of the necessary courses, but each program is likely to have preconditions and requirements. In some cases, the OTA must return to school to obtain a bachelor's degree. In others, she may be able to take additional courses that can complete her associate degree and allow her to enter an ot master's program. Each program determines whether and what courses of an OTA's initial training can be transferred for an OT degree. Some schools offer weekend or bridge programs designed to allow an OTA to obtain an OT degree, according to the Occupational Therapy Association. These programs are often tailored to working adults; these can include distance learning, on-site classes and weekend classes. Some require a bachelor's degree, while others allow the OTA to complete a bachelor's program and then pass a master's degree. In 2013, Florida, Georgia, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin offered at least one of these specialized bridge programs. The time it takes to graduate will depend on the person, but it will probably take at least two or three years. Years.

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
